If U.S. officials have their doubts about a citizen but don't have enough to ask a court for a search warrant, they can just wait for the person to pass through an airport. U.S. airports are what civil-liberty advocates call "constitution-free zones." Federal agents can seize a laptop, mobile phone or other electronic device at an airport check without a warrant or any of the "probable cause" required under the U.S. Constitution. According to [Forbes](#), thousands of people get this treatment every year. What works in America eventually makes its way across the pond. An unnamed Czech police officer told Právo that a customs inspection at an airport is an easy way to get access to someone's personal information, such as the contents of a telephone.
