Talking and acting like Liechtensteins



No mention was made of the Beneš Decrees, according to [Czech TV](#), when Culture Min. Daniel Herman of KDU-ČSL became the first Czech minister in May 2016 to speak at the [Sudeten German Day](#). Herman is now on the [board](#) of the Czech-Liechtenstein Society and is an [honorary consul](#) of the Principality of Liechtenstein. He's lobbying on behalf of a settlement offer from the Prince of Liechtenstein Foundation to end all property disputes with the CR, but he told [Czech Radio](#) that it has nothing to do with repealing the Beneš Decrees. According to the Foundation, Czech Pres. Petr Pavel has [repeatedly said he welcomes an out-of-court accord](#). Pavel has since stated that he has [no intention of interfering](#) with the cabinet's decision-making process, but he did just that by submitting the proposal. Miloš Zeman won the presidency for the first time in part by unfairly accusing Karel Schwarzenberg of talking like a Sudeten German. Herman and Pavel are talking - and acting - like Liechtensteins.
